

NEW BEGINNINGS

As I looked around, I realized that the space we were praying in wasn't a sanctuary -- it was less formal than I had anticipated. In fact, the room looked more like a large dining hall or a high school gym. The men, wearing kippahs and cloaked in white prayer shawls, were in the middle, the women flanking them on either side. Some men stood for the entire service, *davening* and swaying from side to side as they murmured their prayers. Others were more diminutive in their praying. And when the entire congregation sang together, even though I didn't recognize the songs, something about the melodies was achingly familiar to me.

As I observed this very traditional service, I knew I wasn't supposed to be watching everyone else. I was supposed to be focusing on my own prayers. But how was I supposed to do that when I didn't even know half the prayers we were reciting? Even though this was my faith, and we were celebrating a holiday I had participated in for the past 32 years, part of me felt like an outsider.

With the help of my friend's mother-in-law, I struggled through the service. Afterwards, while we walked home in a light rain, I started asking questions: Why did we say the *Amidah* twice? Why did we take three steps backward and three steps forward? Why did it seem like everyone was praying at a different pace? The questions spilled out of me like a torrent. I felt like a nomad wandering the desert, but instead of searching for water, it was answers I wanted. I was craving knowledge. And on that walk home in the rain, I took my first steps in a quest to learn more about my faith.

Growing up in suburban Long Island, the High Holidays were often the only time that my family and many of our neighbors would go to synagogue. Though there was something comforting in the annual ritual of seeing everyone dressed up and praying together in the sanctuary where I had become a Bat Mitzvah, I always felt like something was missing. Perhaps it was the discordant sound of the organ, an instrument that seemed to me to be so out of place in a synagogue. Or maybe it was the fact that most of the congregants spent more time socializing and, more recently, checking their Blackberries for baseball scores, than paying attention to the service. I knew I wanted more, so I began searching for something different.

That search brought me to a traditional synagogue in suburban New Jersey for the High Holidays last year. I was trying to find a deeper connection with G-d, so I asked my more observant friends if I could spend the holiday with them and their extended family. While I knew that I wasn't going to have a spiritual epiphany by attending such a traditional service, I also knew that ushering in another new year at the synagogue where I had

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grown up was certainly not the answer. After two days at the traditional shul, mostly spent in confusion, I didn't necessarily feel much closer to G-d, but I was determined not to give up.

After the second morning of Rosh Hashanah services, we sat around my friend's dining room table and enjoyed a long and plentiful lunch full of laughter and singing. After we *benched* (said Grace After Meals), I saw my opportunity. I started to ask my friend's father-in-law some questions. Patiently, he answered all of them. Then he asked me a question. He wanted to know if I had heard of Rabbi Buchwald, and the Beginners Services he leads at the Lincoln Square Synagogue. I told him I hadn't heard

of the Rabbi or the services, but I was intrigued. I practically begged him to tell me more. According to his assessment, Rabbi Buchwald's service was exactly what I needed, an environment where everyone wanted to learn and a place where I could ask as many questions as I wanted. At the time, it seemed hard to believe that such a place really existed. What Rabbi would tolerate a million interruptions during a Shabbat Service? Of course, that was before I experienced a Beginners Service firsthand.

I left my friend's house feeling unusually centered. Though the two days of praying in a world unfamiliar to me had been quite unsettling, something about this man's confidence in the Beginners Services had convinced me that I needed to experience it myself. I knew I was moving in the right direction.

Now, almost a year later, I am grateful for the advice I was given on Rosh Hashanah. Because of the Beginners program run by Rabbi Buchwald, I have found a community of people who are as excited and passionate to learn more about Judaism as I am. And, just as important, I feel like I have found a spiritual home as well.

I know that the Days of Awe between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are supposed to be a time when we take stock of our lives, reflect and ask for forgiveness. It is a time to recognize our transgressions and make a pact with G-d to try to come closer to living a righteous life in the year ahead. But I also think that the Days of Awe are a time when G-d is listening more acutely to our thoughts and prayers. It is a holy time, and holy prayers are answered. Last year I opened my heart to G-d and asked for guidance, and I can't help but think that G-d knew what I was looking for and answered my humble prayers. Now, when I observe the High Holidays this year with the other beginners at Lincoln Square Synagogue, my prayers will be filled with gratitude for the opportunities I have been given to explore my faith and find a spiritual home.
